WEDNESDAY The Trees in the Garden

Genesis 2:8-9, 15-18

One of the most famous trees has to be in the Garden of Eden. Can you picture it? A place overflowing with life, perfection, and God's presence. "The LORD God made all sorts of trees grow up from the ground—trees that were beautiful and that produced delicious fruit. In the middle of the garden he placed the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil." (Genesis 2:9 NLT) The Garden of Eden and the trees there remind me of God's perfect plan for all of humanity. Even though there was evil lurking in the garden, waiting to make a move, God was already planning our redemption through Jesus. SUNDAY We Need Trees

1 Chronicles 16:33

"Let the trees of the forest sing, let them sing for joy before the Lord, for he comes to judge the earth."

I used to LOVE climbing trees. For me, a good climbing tree is a symbol of childhood. As I sat in the tree, I was always amazed at how the entire tree started as a tiny seed – and that one tree could produce thousands of seeds, which could lead to thousands of trees. In that tree, I was amazed at God's creation, could see the world from a better vantage point, and felt confident, safe, and invincible. Despite the amazing things we have been able to do with trees, the strongest connection many of us get from trees is spiritual. As we work our way through the Bible, trees mark major moments, from Genesis, with references to the Tree of Life and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, through the gospels, where Jesus was nailed to "the tree," and finally to Revelation, where we are reunited with the Tree of Life to sustain us in eternity. The tree is a gift from God to sustain and protect us.

Maybe that is why trees have permeated our spiritual culture as much as they have. We celebrate with our families around the Christmas Tree. We talk about our past and future when looking at our Family Tree. We bury our pets under the tree in the back yard, and place benches in memory of lost loved ones under trees at the park.

As I have gotten older, my relationship with the trees has changed, but I have always had admiration for the beauty, complexity, individuality, and sturdiness of the trees. I may not be able to climb a tree as well as I used to, but I really do enjoy taking a photo of a perfect tree in front of a beautiful sunset.

If you have felt disconnected from God, try to find a tree – to climb, to photograph, or just to admire. How you connect with nature is not the important part, but being present with his creation is our reminder that we will be with the ultimate life-sustaining tree again someday. Maybe that is why I felt so calm as a child in a tree, even when my mother seemed to be WAY more nervous...

WEDNESDAY The Gopher Tree & Olive Branch

Genesis 6:5, Noah's Story

In the days of Noah, we read about how evil humankind had become. In the beginning of Genesis 6, it is quite clear that it broke God's heart and God was not pleased. "But Noah found favor with the Lord." (Genesis 6:8 NLT) Can you imagine being Noah and getting those specific instructions to build the ark, collect food and supplies for your family, and have animals in pairs of every kind coming your way? It must have been very difficult amongst the other people of the day to be the only one doing this. "So Noah did everything exactly as God had commanded him." (Genesis 6:22). Noah was listening for God's instructions, and he acted on them. God asked Noah to build the boat of gopher wood. In the wood of the ark, we are reminded of obeying the LORD even if we're the only one. Is there something God is asking you to do?

The story of Noah and the flood is so familiar. Genesis tells us the floodwaters covered the earth for 150 days. "But God remembered Noah and all the wild animals and livestock with him in the boat...and the floodwaters began to recede." (Genesis 8:1) and "exactly after 5 months from the time the flood began, the boat came to rest on the mountains of Ararat." (Genesis 8:4) Even though the floodwaters were receding, they still weren't able to get off the boat. What a family road trip experience!! After a few attempts of sending birds out to see if there was land, finally a dove returned to Noah with a fresh olive leaf or branch as a sign that the floodwaters were almost gone. After all they had experienced, I have to imagine that olive branch was such a great sign of hope for them. God sends us "olive branches" of hope too. Can you see them? Try to look for signs of hope that God is trying to show you this week.

SUNDAY Hope in New Life

Job 14:7 NIV

At least there is hope for a tree: If it is cut down, it will sprout again, and its new shoots will not fail.

We don't know if Job was referring to a specific type of tree in this passage, but I like to think about the olive tree. In the Middle East, the geographical context for the Bible, the fact that olive trees grow back from the roots is well known. Recent studies of olive trees in the Garden of Gethsemane, in Jerusalem, have established that the roots are at least 900 years old!

In 1998, I had the privilege of touring Israel with a small group. One of our stops was at the Lebanese border, along the security buffer zone. Our tour leader pointed out the new shoots of an olive tree that had been hit by a katyusha rocket during the height of the Israeli-Lebanese conflict in the 1980's. The tree had been destroyed and the stump had been charred by flames. Even so, new shoots had been growing from the roots! Watching those shoots grow over the years had filled our tour leader with great hope.

Have you, like Job, been devastated by events in your life? Have you felt hopeless? I have. On more than one occasion. Yep, pain and loss easily cloud our perspective. But, when we read the end of Job's story, we find that he was eventually healed and restored. Was the damage undone? No. However, we do find Job thriving again. We find that his life was actually like the tree he spoke about.

And like the damaged and charred olive tree with tall growing shoots, I believe we also can recover from the various devastations of life. We just have to wait upon God's grace and power to work in our lives. How long will it take before new shoots can spring forth in our lives? Only God knows. But we must hold onto the hope that we will once again grow, and even flourish. This is the lesson of the Tree of Hope.

WEDNESDAY Trees of Hospitality

Genesis 18:1-5a

The Lord appeared to Abraham near the great trees of Mamre while he was sitting at the entrance to his tent in the heat of the day. Abraham looked up and saw three men standing nearby. When he saw them, he hurried from the entrance of his tent to meet them and bowed low to the ground. He said, "If I have found favor in your eyes, my lord, do not pass your servant by. Let a little water be brought, and then you may all wash your feet and rest under this tree. Let me get you something to eat, so you can be refreshed and then go on your way..."

What do trees teach us about the nature of God and His love for us? After contemplating the Tree of Hospitality for quite some time, one word comes to the forefront. Invitation.

In Genesis, chapters 13-18, we read about the great trees of Mamre. This grove of trees marked the dwelling area of a tribe of Amorites who showed great hospitality to Abraham.

In the ancient world, hospitality meant "graciously receiving an alienated person into one's land, home, or community and providing directly for that person's needs".* Abraham and his entourage were foreigners, temporarily living in that region. The Amorites invited them in. Here Abraham made allies with the Amorites and was allowed to pitch his tent and to build an altar to worship the God who had invited him to leave Ur to come to the promised land.

Later, under these same trees, Abraham was quick to invite three strangers to rest and freshen up their dusty feet. He invited them to eat. He invited them into conversation. He provided graciously and generously for his guests. And in so doing, Abraham entertained angels unaware. He had an encounter with the Lord God Almighty, who then gave Abraham a special promise as well as an invitation to intercede on behalf of others. (You can read this in the rest of chapter 18.)

Hospitality is an invitation to come together. God has invited us into His kingdom. He has graciously offered to provide for our needs. And God has invited us to follow His example.

SUNDAY Ghrist, the True Vine

John 15:1-2

A few years ago, I transplanted some mature grape vines. I remember the first season I got a lot of growth on the vines... but no fruit. I then remembered John 15:1-2 (The Bible is even good for practical applications).

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful." John 15:1-2 NIV

I looked up pruning grapes and was shocked as I timidly cut almost all of the new vines, and left a stick. That summer I was amazed; there was fruit! In addition, a lot of new vines, which again had to be pruned.

Now this is a yearly thing. In the Fall, I mark the very fruitful branches, and cut everything else off. Each year - more fruit, more vines.

Sometimes there are vines that grow off of other vines (not the original vine). None of these produce fruit. Instead, they just suck all the nutrients that is needed for the fruit.

This is a true reflection of what we need to be in our daily walk with the Lord. As Christians we are to produce fruit, not just be 'viney'.

We cannot go off of someone else's faith to produce fruit. We each need to be directly connected to the true vine - Jesus. When we are connected to the main vine (Jesus) we get the nutrients we need to be able to produce fruit.

So how do we get these nutrients? How do we stay connected?

- Through studying God's Word, this helps us to hear what the Lord is saying.
- Through Prayer, which is a conversation with you and God, where you speak and listen (and then obey).
- Through Worship, where you acknowledge who God is... It may be through singing, but it also other means like admiring God's creation and standing in awe of its beauty and intricacies.

So trust this Gardner, stay connected to the vine (Jesus), and allow him to prune you when needed, so you produce fruit.
